1. məlu'laq "corpse", naxnɔq name. ✓

The performer threw ashes about. ✓

2. hai' was for kcamhai' was "woman of southwest wind and rain", a naxnɔq name. ✓

The performer (male) wore a basketry hat, ~~and~~ bracelets and a mask, and impersonated a woman. ✓

3. tiye'itu for kcamtiye'itu "woman of thunder", a naxnɔq name. When it was performed, all the people in the house made a noise like thunder. ✓

4. sqd'laɣu, from 'a'laɣ "angry", a naxnɔq name. ✓  
The performer pretended to seize people as slaves.

5. ha'atu, a naxnɔq name from gitɔnma'ko. ✓  
The performer pretended to be a slave redeeming himself with blankets.

6. sa'nɔs "choking while eating", a naxnɔq name. ✓  
As the guests arrived, he sat in the house eating. Then he had a choking fit.

7. ya'xɣaɣ naxnɔq name  
ya x ya'qade 'witiye' toxs  
suspended where walks the moon (or sun)

The sun is as though suspended as it walks across the sky.

 Relatives: t'əngwax, gitwəng.ε'  
 yax ya'x, gitwəntku' l  
 kwəspi'n, gitkwə' yəm (Babines)

Original home of this house was 'anyε'xta'wis  
 to hide stone axes

not quite a mile below Kigagas on the plateau, on the same  
 side. On the trail to g.aldə'.

kəmgitg, gε'nix had an independent house at this  
 place. There is a big stone there on which they used  
 to sharpen their stone axes.

They were not from git'ang.a's.

Many people [of Kig. ag. as] came from git'ang.a's  
 (It was a village near Bear Lake, on a creek, a  
 gitksan village. Some of the people are at Kig. ag. as.)  
~~git'ang~~

səux kce ti'n another old village of məlu' ləq,  
 at the mouth of water valley 2 miles below Kigagas on the same side  
 where they moved to from 'anyε'xta'wis. The people  
 came to this village from different directions.

No myths take them to Temlaham <sup>in</sup> anyway.

Paul Dzus This family was the first to establish this village. Came  
 from git'ang. as, a village long ago existing the  
 other side of 4th Cabin. A gitksan village. No longer exists.

1. mɔ'dɔxs small bird like an owl, on pole.

mo'u'loq

1. mo'dzaks : hawk represented on robe and pole, and housefront. "No myth, it was simply adopted"

House name      tsam'mo'dzaks      house name

2. mengane'x samgana'°o      "frog steps"  
upwards steps      frog

Guests entering the house stepped on one frog outside the door and another inside the door. Carved about 3 ft. long, with wings. Described in myth.

3. guxt'in      an imitation fish weir (t'in) built inside the house. Arriving guests had to sing their songs at ~~the~~ the door to get it to open and let them through. "a sort of ceremonial entrance":

a naxnɔq  
(and a crest?)

"more a naxnɔq than an 'ay'u'ks (crest). no add'ox 'adɔ'qxs as another name for crest."

4. gela'mo'q "wild celery", on a pole of meluloq at Kugaga, a plain round uncarved pole, still there. <sup>zadabox</sup> Myths.

5. tsagams'ε'qxu "nose like eohoi" Painted on inner walls all around house. No myth.

6. go'tki'aks "small children" no myth. "More a naxnɔq than a crest" Two naked children acted as salmon, swimming in house, which was the "river".
