



We are still looking forward as to what would be the outcome of your good action in presenting our documents to the Provincial advisory committee dealing with the B.C. Indian affairs or problems.

Sir:

Please find herewith a copy of a document sent to the Nishga Tribal Council from the Kitwancool HIGH CHIEFS, dated December 12, 1968, A.D. this document was signed by High Chiefs GWAS -LAM (Abel Campbell) and SIN-Dil; the Chief Councillors did also sign it namely Edgar Good, Lawrence Williams and Vince Gogag; a copy of same was also mailed to the Indian Office, Hazelton, B.C. I am sending this copy to you to show my constant efforts to retain our HIGH REGARDS of THE NISHGA TRIBAL COUNCIL and also to retain order and good faith between the Kitwancool and The Nishga people; in my meeting with the Nishga Tribal Council, in the presence of Mr. Tom Berger, in the Empress Hotel, Victoria, B.C. November 1968, A.D. I told them, with due respect, that the Kitwancool did not want to deal with the matter contained in the document refered to above, openly while their case was before the courts in B.C. knowing that they need all ligitimate help and protection; and when they appeal the case to the supreme Court of Canada, I again strongly avoid any interevntion intervention that might hurt The Nishga Tribal Council although their overlapping land claims on the Kitwancool territory is no small matter in view of The HIGH HONOUR and DIGNITY of the HEREDITARY CHIEFS of The NISHGA and also THE HIGH HONOUR AND DIGNITY OF THE HEREDITARY CHIEFS OF KITWANCOOL.

Sir, Further reason for mailing to you a copy of the ducument mentioned above which, sent to The NISHGA TRIBAL COUNCIL is, that the Federal Government is willing to negotiate with the Indians of B.C. with a view to settle the B.C. Indian land claims of various tribes or of organizations; during the expected negotiation, everyone must not stimulate, stir up any conflicting action; in this way all THE HIGH HONOUR OF EVERYONE OF THE HEREDITY CHIEFS IN THIS province will come out, after satisfactory settlement, intact.

Gentlemen:

The Kitwancool High Chiefs, the people of
Kitwancool and The Council assembled in meeting dealing
with the extend of The Nishga Tribal Council claim and
claiming aboriginal rights or ownership of land in the
Nass Valley and find that The Nishga Tribal Council did wilfully
Claim lands beyond the ambits of The Nishga ancestorial
territory and boundary lines and that The Nishga Tribal
wilfully
Council also claims aboriginal rights and Ownership of
lands that are within the Kitwancool territory without
the consent of the Kitwancool High Chiefs.

At the same meeting, the traditon was found to be just as operative to day so that no one of any Kitwancool decendant, who may be residing at any Nass River Village during the last 100 years or more, or at present, shall have any right to do anything about the Kitwancool land without first consulting his or her CAPITAL namely the Kitwancool

The Kitwancool High Chiefs also find that The Nishga Tribal Council enter
did ener suit against the British Columbia Government
Claiming
Geiming aboriginal rights or ownership of all the lands
mentioned herein including the Kitwancool territory, therefore,
let The Nishga Tribal Council carry out its own action covering
its own territory and not the Kitwancool territory.
