Gentlemen:

The Kitwancool High Chiefs, the people of
Kitwancool and The Council assembled in meeting dealing
with the extend of The Nishga Tribal Council claim and
claiming aboriginal rights or ownership of land in the
Nass Valley and find that The Nishga Tribal Councildid wilfully
Claim lands beyond the ambits of The Nishga ancestorial
territory and boundary lines, and that The Nishga Tribal
Council also wilfull claim aboriginal rights and onership of
lands that are within the Kitwancool territory without
the consent of the Kitwancool High Chiefs.

At the same meeting, the tradition was found to be just as operative to day so that no one of any Kitwancool decendant, who may be residing at any Nass River Village during the last 100 years or more, or at present, shall have any right to do anything about the Kitwancool land without first consulting his or her "CAPITAL" namely the Kitwancool.

The Kitwancool High Chiefs also find that the Nishga Tribal Council did enter suit against the British Columbia Government Claiming about it is a commercial of all the lands mentioned herein including the Kitwancool territory, therefore, let The Nishga Tribal Council carry out its own action covering its own territory and not the Kitwancool territory.

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shown as Kitwancool territory. And of course Meziaden Lake is also shown as Kitwancool territory.

The exact boundary between Kitwancool and Nishga territories is not clear beyond dispute. From the anthropological information which Dr. Barbeau obtained from both Kitwancool and Nishga sources, it is my considered opinion that there are two small areas to which both have a valid claim based on occupancy and use at some time in the past. These are the Kinskuch valley and the Kiteen valley. I have accordingly drawn the map in such a way as to show that both have a valid claim. Please note that I have not given up your claim to these two areas, I have just indicated that the Nishga also have justification for claiming them. That issue does not have to be settled at this time.

Dear Mr. Williams:

Thank you for sending me the copy of your notice to the Nishga Tribal Council. I have discussed it with Tom Berger to ensure that he understands its implications.

The date of the Nishga case has been postponed from January 7 to February 18, at the request of the Crown's attorneys, as they did not consider themselves well enough prepared.

I am very pleased to tell you that Mr. Berger and I have devised a way in which the Nishga case can be tried on its principles without any jeopardy to the rightful claims of the Kitwamcool and other non-Nishga tribes. The lawyers on both sides have agreed to present to the court a map prepared by me showing the areas to which the Nishga indisputably have a rightful claim based on the anthropological and historical evidence. The Nishga have agreed that the case be tried on the basis of these areas alone (although they do not give up the right at some future time to make their claim for the additional territories described in the Nishga petition). I have drawn the map in such a way that the Nass River above the mouth of the Kinskach River is shown as Kitwancool territory. Cranberry River is also
