Colonist June 26 1894 (?)

Died Massett 1894 Albert Edward Edenshaw, chief of the Haidas

"Until he became chief he bore the name Gwai-gu-un-1thin or "The man who rests his head on an island"

He was born at a village called Althins Kwan, which stood on the peninsula now known as Cape Ball ... somewhere between 1810 and 1815.

As early as 1842 when the ship Canada, of New Bedford, visited Skidegate, her first officer considered [him] of sufficient importance to write for him a commendatory certificate:

"About this time [he] removed to North Island ... Here his uncle, bearing the hereditary name of Edenshaw, was already established as a powerful chief." (The chief had no son, so E. married the daughter of an ^[Gao] Alaskan Haida) "On his uncle's death, Edenshaw succeeded ... 6 slaves ... wives dowry 10 slaves ..."

[details of slave trade, wealth]

in the course of his life made no less than seven large potlatches
Fought with Tsimshians at Nass.

"In 1852, Captain Rooney of the schooner Amen Sturges called at Massett... the Indians took possession of the vessel, Edenshaw saved the white men's lives and took them in his canoe to Fort Simpson. Capt. Rooney gave him a document dated Ft. Simpson Oct 10, 1852

The beaver Edenshaw "is chief of the tribe of Indians residing on North Island" He was on board enroute from Skidegate to North Is when Massets attacked. He held them off 7 hours 26 Sept 1852

1853 two government boats visited Edenshaw's territory

HMS Toronto Capt W Houston found E a man of great influence
in the neighbourhood
HMS sloop Virago Comm. JC Prevost found him a fine pilot

"When at the invitation of the Rev. W. H. Colligan the various small tribes on the n shore of Q C I gathered to form one settlement at Massett, Edenshaw came with them and henceforth made Massett his home."

Albert Edward Edenshaw died at Massett Nov 16, 1894. He had 2 children one, George, died before him; the other, Henry, still survives. He was succeeded in the chieftainship by his nephew, Charles Edenshaw

From E-din-so which in the lang. of Ft Wrangell Indians means waterfall as Kennedy, chief factor of HBC in 1851 wrote it as E-din-soo

He received this name "when he succeeded his uncle as the chief of the Shon-gal-th Lennas, who had their headquarters at Dadans, near North Island".

Born about 1812. The uncle he succeeded was a most powerful chief at Dadans near Cape Knox, and bore the hereditary name of Edinso
