kw.ye'.t

Chups

1. kw.ye'.t "small raven" (old term for raven was ye'.t)  
a naxn̄g name. The performer assuming the  
name represented the bird.

2. g.auḡ.g.ən "large univ." (of bear) (other informant  
gave it as a boy's name. Brynon thinks of Slant origin)

3. x̄a'ntk "sticks" a naxn̄g name.

The performer carried a number of sticks, and  
when he leaned them one way or another the members  
of the house would lean in the same direction.

Other informant described performance as "falling of a tree"

4. s̄ad̄ed̄a'.l̄s "creating a disturbance", a naxn̄g  
name.

5. lag.ansha'.utus "gruffly speaking", a naxn̄g  
name.

6. sa'a'l̄su "very careful", naxn̄g. The  
<sup>also worn</sup> performer went about the village very slowly  
and carefully through the village, entering each house.

7. saba'k, a species of <sup>fish</sup> trout with a large mouth,  
a naxn̄g name.

8. ts.b̄a.l̄xe' "stones of the sky", a naxn̄g name.  
During the performance small stones would pelt  
down on the roof like hail, and then a very  
large "hailstone" would be brought in, the  
stone of heaven.

9. txa'gam.l̄xe' "standing up towards the sky", a  
<sup>also worn</sup> naxn̄g name. The performer is a sky-person.  
This is used (and myth is known) by n̄ist̄x̄g, git̄s̄la's.

10. 'waxq̕ə'p "nothing to eat", a naxn̕q.  
He would pretend to be hungry and ask each guest for food. Some would give him food and also gifts, and he would return these doubled at the yéuk.
- 11 'asku'ss̕l "funny or comical", naxn̕q.  
The guests called out the name 'asku'ss̕l quickly and repeatedly, to which he had to reply 'ks̕. He wore a small mask.
12. sa'maq : small clam., a naxn̕q name.  
The performer wore a large robe which he closed over the guests in imitation of a clam.
13. ka'usu "barking", a naxn̕q. ✓
- 14 pa'l̕xanta "spreading out" (the fur of the bear).  
a wamg'an name.  
(other informant said boys name).
15. 'andilu.l̕q "like corpse", a naxn̕q name.  
The performer would represent a corpse, with an old mat for a <sup>robe</sup> blanket. He scattered sparks and ashes from the fireplace on the guests, who did not take offense.
- 16 t̕sqim'a'.x "dying of hunger", naxn̕q.  
The performer wore a mask representing a person starving to death and weak from hunger.
- 17 ni-salu'b̕st "grandfather of needle" a wamg'an name. [Informant was not aware of custom of naming after a slave].

Bear:

1. g.aphe'tit

"up standing" (bear) indicating *lax kibu* origin.  
or: g.aphe'hé'it g.an'm t'sam'a'us

over standing pole of "

The pole of (place name at mouth of Skeena) stands on one side and then the other. Name is of Kitselas origin.

2. t'mindi'c "will upwards shove" (its offspring, the bear).

3. t'six s g.ag.é'.ix "naughty wings" (of eagle).  
Downriver origin indicated (Kitselas)

4. kwidzax

kwidzax - has large beak the eagle (or raven)

5. ligitkwoxs g.éxs

about sawing (the eagle) The eagle caws about like the raven.

6. hadoks'amé'

wihadoks same' f wi'igin'su  
big loud roaring (of) big grizzly

7. ligida'uk's "about turning" (eagle on top of tree). The eagle looks about from side to side from the top of the tree.

8. tice'.xu "will speak of" (the frog).

9. snigwan

nikwilant xske'k 'a'lax g.an  
on three eagles on top of tree

10. sqaq̓ἐ·tu "across piercing" (the side of the bear).  
The side of the bear is being pierced by a spear.

11. ligiu'·un

ligiu'·un t̕itkul t̕xs  
constantly holding? offspring of the moon  
Neither informant clear on meaning.

12. 'a̓dza̓pw̓ἐ·ix "without fins" (the frog).

13. lɔg̓.ɔm x kwi'·uk

lɔg̓.ɔm x kwi'·uk t̕ smax  
rotten eating groundhog bear

The rotten remnants of the groundhog eaten by the bear

14. 'uxs g.aus "out from shore jumps" (the small frog).

15. laxsuks "on drift log" (on which sits the small frog).

16. g.anā'um dzəm wi'lp "frog in the house"

17. sqaq̓nu'

sqaq̓nu' ufkw̓ g.anā'·o  
across dead little frog

The little frog <sup>was</sup> dead across the trail

18. ~~pastq̓ant~~ q̓ldəpl̓a'x "to wrinkle up"  
(the hips of the small frog).

1. cu'zyo:n "new leaves"
2. se'ε/as (see above, men's names)  
used by both men and women, naxnɔ:g name.
3. txalgamla:x' (see above). Also used by men  
or women as naxnɔ:g name.

## Girls:

1. naha'baks Two interpretations given:  
"among grass" (the frog), and  
"together attacking" (the wolves)
2. ləpdəda':ox  
"by itself freezing" (the small frog)  
or "by itself hardens" (the excrement of the bear)
3. 'ma:wən  
spag. et ma'.wən 'w, ləgwit ye'.t g.ana":  
among seeds? where walks about the frog
4. q'a'ndəx (2 interpretations)  
1. ninag.andəx tkət k'i:t sməx  
on over lying offspring of bear  
The cubs of the bear lie over (a log?)  
2. t q'a'ndəx tət k'i:t xs̥kε:k | The offspring of  
exposed lie offspring of eagle | The eagle lie exposed  
Origin: house of q'aq, laxskii:k, Ketwanga .

5. cu·da·t "new woman" (endearing term)
6. xstiy̥g.əmni'de "haughty on sitting" (the eagle on top of the tree).
7. taxamyo'·s "bad trail" (of bear)
8. c̥w̥ig.a'nt "to wave away stick" The small frog is chased away with a stick.
9. maxt̥ba't "over across spread out" (the frog on top of the log).
10. k̥a·a'lg̥xs "again speaks" (the frog before it slaps). Other informant: The frog is just speaking.
11. g.am.g.ət g̥i'lba'l "only two" (offspring of bear).
12. C̥ig̥iga'mk "still warm" (the dead bear), or "still warm" (the excrement of the bear).
13. 'ału·kca'·ux "visible going out" The bear can be seen when it comes out from its den.
14. 'ału·daxta't "visible eating small shrub" (the bear)
15. 'na·xa'ts "down from the hills to eat" (comes the bear)
16. lu·t̥ap̥t̥o'xs "in underneath" (small frog) The little frog swimming along the bank disappears underneath the edge.

17. lu·tspag. et'a'lqəx "in amongst speaking" (the small frogs).
18. 'axti·la'wil "cannot do anything" (the small wolf.)
19. ałg. ał·a'-ux "looks upon trout" (the raven)

- (1) modi'-gam dzaw̄iyaks Grizzly bear of the sea. A carving of a grizzly with a fin, at Kipiox. There is a myth.
  - (2) 'n̄ext 'blackfish' On a pole at Kipiox
  - (3) ts̄na'nux : small human beings on a pole
  - (4) { ma's'wa'tsx white otter on pole.
  - (5) ma's'a'ntx white porcupine
  - (6) ske'msam bird.

- 1. ts̄na'nux : human being on the pole
- 2. ske'msam : golden eagle
- 3. tkw̄tsam 'n̄ext : pounce of blackfish
- 4. modi'-gam dzaw̄iyaks :
- 5. ma's'awats white porcupine on pole alongside:

House Names

- 1. tag.amha-st : da'ag of feruced Was the name of the house at Temlaham. The next was shown in this house.
- 2. ts̄amske'msam "inside golden eagle", was the house at lax̄angwa'lk, and had this bird on interior house posts
- 3. ts̄am ts̄na'nux was the house at k̄sag.anā'-o
- 4. tag.amha-st , the (da'ag) house at Kipiox.

No slaves, no war names, no canoe names; had copper but no names for them.
