

Origin of git'and>

(Early groups)

gitwilksab'e'

"The git'and> once were of the gispax'lots, and when the children of ga'alksak grew, it was then that the git'and> started off on their own chieftainship. They had not been a tribe before that.

There were 2 small independent groups of people
 1. at gitwilgaxsu 2. the gitkspax'ot
 were all gispawudward> crest and over them was
 ge'otuk [I] as sam'ogot when the git'and> were of the
 gispax'lots still. These people were treated more or less as
 servants of the gispax'lots, and when he so wished legex
 used to treat them harshly. Sometimes he would not let them
 have water, and in every way he made them miserable. Because
 their water buckets were destroyed all the time, these git'and>
 people made thick buckets that could not be destroyed, and
 they were sometimes called gitwit'agax't'si'umt
 people of large thick bucket

And he used to treat them as slaves. When he had a chance,
 he would sell one of them, which gave rise to another term
 ga'otot/ga'kut, which is what legex used to do. When
 to sell for beads

he fancied beads sold by other tribes he would sell one of the
 git'and> for them, and this is still used at present to throw
 shure to the git'and>. And when the children of ga'alksak
 (the elder of whom was sagawet) he did not like the way
 the gispax'lots treated the git'and> and he (sagawet) took
 this git'and> people and moved from the gispax'lots village,
 and moved to gispax'ot and to gitwilgaxsu. These people
 were not known as git'and> when under gispax'lots but were
 known as gitwilksab'e' people, and when sagawet came with
 his followers of the gispax'lots into the territory then governed
 by ge'otuk (of gispax'ot), ge'otuk retired voluntarily and
 (gave) his position of sam'ogot to sagawet. But sagawet
 was not recognized as a big chief. Then the people of gispax'ot
 and gitwilgaxsu and those from the gispax'lots changed their

name to git'na'do. "people of over there" and
people of over there

git'and'o is the ga'nəmx term for it.

The original houses that came from gispax'łts

1. gistε'ku [III, laxskiək] was of the gitwilksəbe gispax'łts then

2. gayε'lowx [V ganhada] " " " " , not related
to niasyayiyunet

3. niost'səlewano's was one of the gispax'łts gitwilksəbe
[VII ganhada]

4. gɔ's [IX 6 gisp] was one of the gitwilksəbe' gispax'łts (gispəw)

5. la'xs [XI laxskiək] " " " " " "

[IV ganhada] niasyayiyunet was not of that group. He was originally
of gispax'ł and independent, the səm'ɔ'gət of the ganhada
group. He was from the kst'u's river (gispax'ł people)

[IX a gispəw] gasyε't was also of gitwilgaxsu', under ge'ɔ'tuk
[VI ganhada] laxlitkwa was from gispax'ł under niasyayiyunet;
closely connected but an independent house. According to the myth
they were always from gispax'ł, no other place.

[VIII ganhada] txatkwεtk is from niasyayiyunet, same crests and myth.

[IX gispəwad] gasyε'tk was from gitwilgaxsu under ge'ɔ'tuk, of
the ləkakiget.

[X gispəw] halɔp accompanied the children of ga'ɔ'ksək when the
git'and'o village was formed on the Skelaa. Orig. a gitnagunaka

These gitwilksəbe' people were mostly divided between the gilodza
and the gispax'łts. The gitwilksəbe people used to go between these
two tribes, helping both. They were more or less independent, but mostly
under the chieftainship of legεx and niaszawε'. They had no chief
of their own. These later left the village and divided themselves
among the two tribes. In the gilodzax there are many gitwilksəbe
not mentioned in Swanson's list. 1. t'saxamtkwā' (gispəw)
2. t'x' (ganhada) 3. mɔ'.lɔxən (ganhada) 4. wɔ'mdzəp (ganhada) 5. kse'qɔ'
(lookuk). These are all gitwilksəbe' (gilodza), all extinct. Not one gitwilksəbe
left anywhere. At one time in the past they were a most populous tribe.

git'ands' "This group on the Skeena in original times were composed ^{entirely} of gispawud. and ganhada houses, having as its royal house the house of getuk. This house had married into the house of nisswamek, and while they were living in the Skeena, and the house of getuk became extinct except for this woman who was married to gutxex of the royal house of nisswamek. gutxex then assumed the chieftainship of his brother in law and established his house which afterwards became the royal house of sqagwet.

It is evident that g.ankada under n1254axiyune't i.e. V, VI, VIII, and IX are original g. t'ands'. They own Exstew hwer.

laxlitkwa (VII, g.ankada) came later from ^{g. t'axtet.} Estall.

n125xto' (III, laxskio'k) came later from g. lodzax.

sq. aqwe't (I laxskio'k) came later and owns no territory.

The g. spawudwado territories (X and XI) are across the river, isolated. Connected with g. inaxang'ik g. spawudwa'do?
