It was not originally their crest. It was acquired in recent times from the Tsimshian who came here to trade. It was a mask, a max n̄q, and it was formally adopted by this house as a crest. It is shown on a pole now at Kipayaks, a sitting bear.

3. ti.u'zn : brant on top of same pole.

This is not their own crest, but was adopted from a maxn̄q of k̄im̄xshan, gitlaxda'mks, ganha'ds (Rass). Informant doesn't see why they use it

Informant is a swan of this house, says they have no myth.

Jimmy Williams version, 1920.

One time a Tsimshian raiding party captured *Iux̄k̄ist* of the house of *xt̄ad̄st*. *he·1* of *gitxa'ta* redeemed him, under the mistaken impression that he was a direct nephew of *gwiyamb̄s* (who was a relative of *he·1*, having the same origin). *Iux̄k̄ist* "was really of the house of *'ałq* who is of the house of *l'a'n*".

While with *he·1* at *gitxa'ta*, *Iux̄k̄ist* was holding a shield of *he·1* and it urinated on him. This placed *he·1* under obligation to *Iux̄k̄ist*, and he gave him one of his names *q.e.1* and also a crest called *Iu'a yu'q̄x* (shown on front of house of *qe.1* at Kuspax, ^a many humans on top of each other, with large mouths. *Adaox* is known to *gitxa'ta* but not here).

he·1 took *Iux̄k̄ist* to Kitselas and gave him over to his brother chief *n̄istax̄s̄k*, who in turn took him back to Kispayaks.

When *qe.1* (now known as such) returned he went back into the house of *l'a'n*, and (about 4 generations ago) "he stood ~~up~~ out for himself" "assuming the rights of *gwiyamb̄s*". ^{Established himself over that house.} The house of *gwiyamb̄s* were going to recover their supremacy among the people when the law prohibited potlatches.

Regards *qe.1* as uncoupled and still actually in house of *l'a'n* although he assumed position of house of *gwiyamb̄s*.

Controversy over name q.e.1

q.e.1 (then known as cu·ns - naxn̤q. "blind") was always head chief of Kispayaks. He came from anlagas̤m̤d̤x near Liagagas, leaving his close relative w̤iq̤et there. His crests were

1. medi'gam dzaue'aks
2. lu'ayu'q

One time n̤istax̤'k and q.e.1 (a different q.e.1) came to Kispayaks from Kitselas to trade, and stayed in the house of q.e.1 (cu·ns), who gave a great potlatch. n̤istax̤'k took his red paint and painted the medi'gam dzaue'aks on the houseposts, which explains why they have this crest. q.e.1 bestowed his name on the house of cu·ns.

"This house was connected with the house of l·a·n; he [l·a·n?] was the original head of this house. This name of cu·ns is still used by this house as a chief's name." Other chiefs in this house are x̤k̤ad̤st, k̤stiyag̤sm̤c̤mas, l·a·n, su·ns, 'a'lux, n̤istax̤'k. g.alha·itan is not of this house but of q̤isq.aq.a.s, but of the same family of k̤isq.aq.a.s. The present holder of the name lives at Kispayaks.

This house used to be the foremost house of Kispayaks.

At one time the house of l·a·n became extinct, and the

house of cu'ns split in two: $\times k'a'dst$ and $\dot{t}a'gwix$ left and reestablished the old house of $\dot{t}a'n$ and took the piste'; rest as their own, renouncing the ones they had had before.


The 2nd house remained, consisting of cu'ns and $\dot{t}alux$, and they retained their crests.

They [two houses] used the names in common, interchangably.

It was after this that cu'ns changed his name to q̥l.

Rank of q̥l'sg.a'st houses at kispayaks at that time:

1. cu'ns, q̥l, etc
2. q̥tludat
3. w̥ssomlax'e' (incl. nuxs) a sep. house
4. kwiyet
5. $\dot{t}a'n$
6. $\dot{t}ilabaksu$




