She had a little grease stored in the bladder of a mountain goat, which she sucked at each stop. After 4 days the grease was gone. They were at the canyon of the ksmg. st river. She put moss in the bladder to make it appear full. When all the food was gone except one half salmon they sat down and sang a dirge <sup>the half of salmon</sup> nist'it's hñ, cooked and divided the salmon, and called for the grease. They were angered to find only moss, and beat the woman and deserted her, breaking her and leaving her in the wrecked camp. They put out the fires, but a sis-in-law saved a spark in a sea shell and left it (and after the others had left she came back and started a fire & freed the woman.)

The gosp went on up the ksmg. st to timberline and ha'ots hunted, without success. The youngest bro and his dog went up the mountain of ganagwiyuk. In spring they started back toward Robin Village qilak. A young man determined to find out what had happened to his elder bro's wife.

The deserted woman warmed herself at the fire, made a shelter of wreckage. Day by day, animals <sup>and</sup> birds would come close to her which she killed for their meat and skins. She made a canoe, a headdress, and a special garment of caribou hide:
