a woman informant

The qidayanits raided gitxa'ta and took a cousin of he'l as slave. His name was 'aksk. wihs'n, spinyan & qilaxaks went and ransomed him and wihs'n took him into his house as a brother (at j. tw. lgzts). 'aksk fell in love with wihs'n's sister g. ands-x [same phratry, so incestuous relationship]. They arranged to fall captive to wudste, escaped, and went to ktkwint's-i-en [Khtada or Alder] on Skuna, up trib and built house on island. Four boys (gamayem, nags'lat, ?, kezis), two daughters. Lived alone. He taught them to fight. gamayem became the foremost warrior and in his raids on the qidayanits would cry gamayem x.a.t (x.a.t is I am in Hlengt). He made a wooden decoy figure for his canoe which drew enemy fire.

An attack made them flee to another creek, kaidzaks, and made a house up on a plateau ^{laxst's-lam p'z-tszm} _{on beaver plateau} or t's-tszm sgani's plateau mountain. Attacked frequently. Finally defeated and fled up the Skuna past swift water of q. tsis too of kadzsq'. To a little below the q. tsolas village, a place called sgaskini's where they settled. Planned revenge. Made p'z'm skinis "trapdoor of pitch (pine)", moved down to kxe'n, made fortified da'ax and planned to kill Hlengts [see narr. for details].

'aks wiped the qidayanits out. Save by yesk, gamayem showed his decoy g. ansehaw'e.l aiming straight arrow as a crest. 'aks aged, returned alone to gitxa'ta to his own relatives. Took the g. ansehaw'e.l (it afterward became the lg. dit of nizswexs).

This is origin of house of qilaxaks (? name has nothing to do with 'aks].

Myth of crest 'asi'we'lqit (thunderbird) of house of
Saxsa'axt, qispawudwadz, gitwilqats.
Edmund Patalas to Brynion, 1948

ga'yé', a hunter in the house of saxsa'axt, was hunting seals and sea lions near Dundas Island. Sitting on a rock was a huge bird, with several figures which resembled men beside it. The bird flew away and waited. ga'yé' saw a canoe come from Dundas Island to investigate the human figures, and saw the bird return ^{amidst} with thunder and lightning and seize the occupants of the canoe. It shrieked 'ihí, 'ihí, and from this the little island was named Iax'ihí (Green Island). The thunderbird was using the human-like figures as bait to catch people.

ga'yé' returned home, told what he had seen, and assumed the bird as a crest of the house. He called it 'asi'we'lqit "accident to people", and represented it as a giant eagle with lightning coming from its eyes and thunder from the flapping of its wings.

Myth of q.ansu' totem pole of saxsa'axt, qispawudwadz,
gitwiq'sts.

At Tsimshian, the people saw a strange m'di'k
(grizzly bear) with abalone shell on its eyes, ears,
and breast. They set out to slay it, and saxsa'axt
was the one who succeeded, so he adopted it as a
crest. He erected a slanting pole, with a
tkuwe'kskm m'di'k (prince grizzly) at the base
as though climbing, and another at the top. He
called the pole q.ansu' "shaking stick" (when the
bear climbed on it). He claims this exclusively
although there is much dispute among the
qispawudwadz over who has the main rights
to the grizzly.

At Mitlakatla was such a leaning pole.
At Pt. Simpson, saxsa'axt and ni-slis's erected
one near the bandstand, but it was upright.

ni-slo's

Wallace on grizzly crests:

m̄s g.a.'l bal̄e' white breast abalone "pearly white breast" of grizzly bear. Shells are sewn on the breast of the whole grizzly skin used by ni-slo's.

TP. On his TP at Simpson, is a grizzly with its breast (belly) pulled open by a human figure. This belongs to him too. This is practically another crest, as it refers to a different myth.
