Men

1. 'am-äge't "good (jolly) person", a naxn̄g.
The performer would come before his guests and begin to roar with laughter. The guests would imitate him, and he would then be called 'am-äge't.
2. 'a'laxni'sux "never heeding", a naxn̄g name.
The person would act disrespectfully toward his guests, never heeding warnings to stop.
3. ni-snawē' Informant knows this is a q̄lodzau ḡispwadwa'do name, doesn't know why it is her.
4. x̄t̄'makses "throw mud at", naxn̄g name
The performer would throw mud and dust at his guests.

Boys

1. la-ha'st "bad fireweed" i.e. deformed.
2. his'nū'utuxs "feigning death" (the small frog)
3. 'uxstag.ə'us "into the water jumps" (the small frog).
4. cag.ə'tkcewa'n "together out of the hole, setting" (the offspring of the frog)

5. 'atix səm nəq "never real dead" (the frog)

1. k̥ʷl̥uʔam "by itself bright" (the moon)

These 3 have same crests & myth

kwołax'q'a'n "grizzly bear skin" (or g̓ilax'gan)
of g. a l d o . and this t'amaget are practically
the same house and use the same crests.
kwołax'q'a'n is a naxn̓q not a crest.

- J. Williams 1. smax het xut sma'x 'standing bear'
standing with forepaws raised at bottom of pole
2. 'wəl'εq̓x "horsefly" shown on the
pole as a being with a long beaklike
nose.

Custom made 3 'ya g.a'mas̓la x t̓sa'k a custom of
this house, which was assumed as a crest.
The women of the house would paint a red
stripe down the forehead to the nose, which
would indicate that the house was giving a
feast the next day.

It was represented on the pole as a human
being with a stripe down its nose.

- 4 la' yaspanc "large belly"
Being with a long nose [?]

Snow:

naxn̓sq? 1. lege'nskwu grizzly - man wears whole skin. Also
called kwel a'x g.an

2. he'tkut sma'c bear standing up on pole

3. lɔ' yaspanc "big belly" person with long nose
on pole

naxn̓sq? 4. wu'l̓εq̓ "horsefly". a naxn̓sq The performer
is dressed like a big "spider" and goes around
potlatch pointing at ('biting') chips, who are
then paid.

5 ya g.a'ma'c em lax tsaq : red along bridge of nose
When the house was to give a potlatch, all its members,
painted forehead to nose red to show they were giving
it, and everybody stayed around after singing that.

Williams into down red over on nose
