History of q̓it̓iks

This village was founded by gadaxex when he returned from among the Haida. He had for a time lived among the g̓ispawndwado at k̓isdz̓x. From then he started his own village at q̓it̓iks. He was later joined by n̓ishust (g̓ispaw) and n̓isdz̓t (ganhada) who was originally of the Upper Nass. They were joined from time to time by others of tingit origin, and legex gave several feasts and iyaak there, in common with other l̓axskiks.

q̓it̓iks was very open to attacks by Haidas and others, so they moved to gw̓onw̓x where at the time many of the huge were living. At that time the head chief of gw̓onw̓x was g̓it̓x̓an. There were also many g̓ispaw! led by n̓ishiyos, and ganhadas, n̓isdz̓t.

One day they saw the canoes of Tsimshian raiders coming to attack the village. w̓stən̓l̓us̓l̓g. and tsin̓teg. of the house of t̓xałax̓et attacked them, killing two warriors, and they gave up their attack.

Haidas fled, and Tsuge canoes from angede, gitlaxans, gunwsg harassed them all day, killing many, including the leading chief of the Sanine named Sanaxet. He was shot by a gitlaxkanks. Next 2 yrs Haida came back on raids, unsuccessful. Finally made peace.
