Fraser
Sept '41 - "Behind Point Roberts there was a large camp of about a thousand savages, inhabitants of Vancouver's Island, who periodically cross the Gulf to Fraser's River, for the purpose of fishing" p 183

Comox
Sept 10 - (Fraser to St. Revelle) "In the course of the forenoon, three villages of Comox, that were opposite to Point Mudge, sent off forty to fifty canoes to us, whose inmates, amounting perhaps to eight hundred... made all sorts of noises to induce us to stop" p 186

"In the afternoon, we passed another village, near the narrowest point of Johnston's Straits." p 187

Ma-ta-hell
Kwakwaka "They made sad work, by the by, of his name; for, whenever his head showed itself above the bulwarks, young and old, male and female, vociferated, from every canoe, Ma-ta-hell, Ma-ta-hell, Ma-ta-hell - a word which, with the comparative indistinctness of its first syllable, sounded very like a request on this point that the trader might go a great way beyond the engineer's furnace." p 193.

"Shushady Newettee

Bella Bella
p 202 St. Nicholas. "In the neighbourhood of the fort was a village of about five hundred Balla bollas, who spoke dialect of the Brakcolth lang. 6 wks before, 300 BB had attacked a ^{Haida} village, butchered all but 1 m. 1 w. Captive shot BB chief - buried in fort garden, in mourning. Canoe 60 x 6 1/2 x 4 1/2 p 204

Simpson
p 206 Fort Simpson. "Fort Simpson is the resort of a vast number of Indians, amounting in all to about fourteen thousand of various tribes... Chinooks "of whom about eight hundred are settled near the establishment, as home guards, under the protection of our guns" (p 206). Sebacamen, Kygarne, Tongass, - - -

Smallpox
"I observed among the people traces of the smallpox, eight of them having lost an eye each. That destructive pestilence had got thus far south, but no farther, carrying off

about one third of the population" p 207 Since then wolves
scarce, caught it from eating dead bodies. p 207
