Tsimshian Hespeduwada.

"The chiefs that came with saxsa'ot from demlaxam. members of the royal gispawadwads
wives - genaxangek
nidswe's - g'madiks
nidniawa' - gitudza

tsiba'sa' gitxata
nidspkumisk - gitudzay
alimtaxa - genaxangek

These were all descendants of ga'u's at demlaxam
Ga'u's had four sons and four daughters

1. Tigiyan the youngest son (tigiyā'wan)
- daughters 1. ksmwādzaxtē'ls
2. ksm hamhe'm
- 3 ksm gitlaxwi'hō'gōn
- 4 ?

The chief of all the gisp. at demlaxam was
'n̄ashā'wət̄xs (now belonging to g'dzalasy) and the other
main chief was 'n̄psdax̄'s̄x (gitsalas). The direct
descendants of ga'u's are nidswe's, tsibasa.

They use the myth of ga'u's more than the other gisp.
and also have ga'u's a figure representing her as a crest
and bring it out and show it to the people when either of them
have an iyauk (potlatch). The other royal gisp are
related to nidswe's & tsibasa and alimtaxa.
These three are related to each other. Therefore these 3
chiefs have exactly the same crests (exclusive to them)

1. ligidit
2. b̄thām hakw̄tak pearl bow in hand of ligidit
3. m̄sa'bā'xs red cedar leggings
4. f̄t̄k̄m̄n̄s̄x̄t robe of Bearfin
5. neq'a'm saḡ'tk human scalp.
6. gal̄ma'ti mtn goat headdress
7. 10 layer hat of spruce roots

Counts of the three wekist royal g̓̓p̓̓wudwads chiefs
n̓̓sw̓̓x̓̓s, tsib̓̓sa', and alim la'xa
tsib̓̓sa'

- (1) ligidi'it a rep. of a live human being on a totem pole, on top, made to revolve in the wind. A small figure of the same is used in warfare and made in such a way as to move and revolve not a n̓̓n̓̓y.
- (2) b̓alha'm hakwata'k pearl bow which was held in the hand of the ligidi'it (diff from bow of n̓̓sw̓̓x̓̓)
- (3) mesab̓̓a'xs red leather leggings worn in war, naming ceremony, and iyek.
- (4) t̓̓t k̓̓m̓̓ne'xt a robe of Blackfish, made of leather, covers the entire body excepting face. And the head of the ne'xt or the top of the head. On the back and front of robe are representations of the ne'xt.
- (5) neg̓̓a'm sag̓̓'l̓̓k : a scalp of a human, with fangs on top. This is the scalp headdress which the g̓̓dzax̓̓ta't took from tsib̓̓sa' in war but was afterwards returned to him in a great ceremony on which coppers were broken, and it no longer belongs to the g̓̓dzax̓̓ta't but only to the 3 royal houses.
- (6) g̓̓lk̓̓ma'ti : a mountain goat headdress used on ceremonial occasions, never used on poles or robes.
- (7) la'n̓̓m̓̓ga'i't a hat made of 10 layers high of spruce root. Used in ceremony of assuming a higher position or name. Not known whether used on poles.

Johnson: Temlakam

The Temlakam were not known as gispawudwa'ds but as gisgahe's, the he's being their main crest. The royal Temlakam came out singly to the coast and became associated with the Taxm'n people. The Temlakam people had the modik as ^{this} crest, and the Taxm'n had the modigm dzagomarks; that is why they became associated.

Taxm'n

The qinaxangik are the Taxm'n: loplidzi'ust, gamaye'm, lamlaxe, nisetnets, gigoksamewlp, adzaks. Their crests were the 'next' and modigm dzagomarks.

Gitnugunaks

They were called "gispawudwa'ds" while they were among the gidsat'su. This is the name all the groups use; as long as they have the modik or the 'next', they are gispawudwa'ds. How did they become associated with the Taxm'n and the Temlakam? Their crest was the 'next', and the Taxm'n also had the 'next'. Both having the same crest, they recognized that they were related.

qitksndzs

The qitksndzs came here together, all at one time, after a fight on the Nass. They are

1. negamda and niskwex's (gilodza'z)

2. suhalait }

3. wigt } gispaxlsts

4. niyuks, rananex, nisha bo'tk (q.tlen).

There are no others. When niyuks gives a potlatch, his helpers are the gilodzas and gispaxlsts mentioned. All the other gispawudwa'ds are invited as guests and receive gifts.

To Johnson being married

Getnagunaks.

Matthew Johnson - g'spaxlts file.

"The getnagunaks here never formed ^{found?} any groups. groups, but the g'spaxlts people. But they were gspewudwada among the g'dstsnu. This was the name used by them 'g'spawudwa'ds'. This name was also applied to other groups. The names of different grp groups are all more or less alike ... they have no general name. It makes no difference what they are called by, as soon as they have the m'disk or 'next', they are grp.

How did the getnagunaks & Tomlaxam (diff myth, crests and names) come to be together and form one grp group? Answer: the crest of the nagunaks was the next; the crest of the Taxm^zn was also the next and the m'disgm dzaym'aks. These people both having the same crest the next recognized that they were related to each other by using the same crest. The Tomlax'am were not known as gspewudwade but as g'isga he's, he's being their main crest. These people royal tom/lax'am came out singly to the coast and became associated with the Taxm^zn people. The crest of the Tomlax'am people was the m'disk and coming into contact with Taxm^zn group was also the m'disgm dzaym'aks. So that is why they became associated with them.

- ④ The m'disgm dzaym'aks does not belong to the getnagunaks but to the Taxm^zn grp.

gitksədəz

Matthew Johnson, g̓ilədza̓x file.

niyuks was of gitksədəz origin ... The gitksədəz people came here together, all at one time, after a fight on the Nass; these groups of gitksədəz:

1. neganda'o and niʔskwə'xs group (g̓ilədza̓x)
2. suhalait (g̓ispaxlə'ts)
3. wiget (under house) g̓ispaxlə'ts
4. niyuks (g̓itlen) and anʔe'x, n̓is̓habo'tk

No other gitksədəz. When niyuks gives a potlatch, his helpers are

1. neganda'o, lełokskams, yus etc
 2. suhalait
 3. wiget n̓is̓skwə'xs
- all the other grsp. are invited as guests and receive gifts.

gitlaxksət'i:n

The gitlaxksət'i:n grsp. were

1. niaskseñet
 2. n̓ispint
- no other

These two houses were known as sam g̓ilədza̓j;
real g̓ilədza̓
