

"Suwiaus, brave of Qaldu."

qald's' raid on Tsetsant.

[This is another version of suw. g.a.us raid on the Tsetsant and the acquisition of the Shadows and Manup a tree crests. This abstract is therefore very short].

Because of Tsetsant raids very few people were left at qald's'. Their warrior, suw. gaus, had a daughter, and resolved that only the bravest man would marry her. suw. gaus scouted out the Tsetsant village of underground houses, and made himself an armoured grizzly bear skin. gutkwinnuxs of Kispayaks came and flung open suw. gaus' noisy door [of deer hoofs] and gave him presents, and was accepted as his son-in-law.

Preparations were made and a war party set off. Two days later they saw "wiggly things" g. an o'tsg. an [shadows] in a lake and took it as a crest. They made camp under a tree in which a wild naked man was living. Several tried, but gutkwinnux was successful in pushing the creature out of the tree, and he gave it to suw. gaus as a crest, the nidaapsmlax g.a'n "man that lives on the tree". gutkwinnux put on the grizzly skin and enticed the Tsetsant from their huts. The Tsetsant men chased the bear, their arrows and spears having no effect, and were led into an ambush where they were all killed. suw. gaus went into the holes and killed the women and children. They returned to qald's' victorious and with two new crests. They gave a great yuk (potlatch) and invited the Kugagas, Kispayaks, and Ketanmaks people, and erected a pole bearing the two crests.

The pole is still there, in qalid>, in front of  
the house of t̄be<sup>1</sup>, lax kibū (The grizzly armour  
was not a crest).
