Some time ago I obtained a set of terms of relationship from a Mass River chief that was visiting Ottawa. Before publishing this material, I should like very much to be able to make a few comparisons with corresponding Tsimshian terms. Dr. Boas has published an account of the Tsimshian system in his recently nublished volume on Tsimshian Mythology, and I should like to have this material corroborated and completed before making the comparison. I should, therefore, be much obliged to you if you could in the near future let me have the Tsimshian terms corresponding to those that I have listed for Mass River, also any supplementary terms or information in regard to terms that you think I ought to have. Whatever you are able to send me will be most highly appreciated and duly credited in the forthcoming publication.

I take this opportunity of expressing to you my appreciation of the invaluable help that you have been to my colleague, Mr. Barbeau, and hope that you will long continue to devote your interest and energy to etynological work.
